We work closely to create programs and initiatives in Haiti.

Understanding How the Haiti Project Works

HAITIAN ART

The purchase of original artwork from Haiti supports the livelihood of hundreds of Haitian artists. The art is a rich, dynamic medium that showcases a different, beautiful side of Haiti that is neglected in mainstream media. Our art sales in turn fund not only the artists but also sustainable development initiatives in over 45 villages in Haiti.

ART SALES

Art sales in turn provide a source of revenue which funds sustainable development initiatives in over 45 mountain communities in Haiti. For every painting we sell, we in turn buy another piece from Haiti. Art Sales provide a space to showcase a different, beautiful, side of Haiti that is neglected in mainstream media.

INITIATIVES IN HAITI

For 21 years, we have partnered with the people of Haiti to support ongoing programs that include primary, secondary, and adult Education, as well as Healthcare, Reforestation, Water Purification, and a Women's Cooperative. These initiatives help to set up structures that will live for generations in the communities of northwest Haiti.

MENTOR STUDENT LEADERSHIP

VHP activities create a rich laboratory, providing Vassar students with a transformative experiential education in global citizenship. Students work closely with the co-founders, key members of the Poughkeepsie community, and partners in Haiti to prioritize organizational goals and plan events.



What We Want You to Know

Sustainability and Partnership

An ethos that has been central to our work from the very beginning is partnership, which in practice means to have our on-the-ground initiatives in Haiti be driven organically by our Haitian partners' priorities. Ongoing discussions with the people in Haiti with whom we work guide the foundation and direction of all funded efforts. This is especially important in Haiti, where good but unvetted ideas of many a U.S. - based organization have led to so many unfinished or irrelevant projects. Until recently, we would regularly hold these discussions during our twice annual trips, and follow up via email. Since the ongoing period of unrest, emerging technology has allowed us to maintain frequent communications via Zoom calls. In all cases, the goal is always to make sure we are meeting the needs as dictated by our Haitian partners.


Reflected in our mission is the core value of sustainability. Our efforts are not simply to fund projects, but to work with our partners in search of longer-term solutions. As an example, the chicken program will reduce the cost of school breakfasts by providing an ongoing supply of eggs. Our community based reforestation program seeks to sustainably build environmental and food security alike. In particular, the planting of many thousands of coffee plants will provide the local women's cooperative with the beans to rebuild what was once a thriving coffee business. And the capacity building construction at the medical clinic includes the installation of solar panels to provide electricity ensuring that better health diagnoses can support our physician at the clinic. He is affiliated with the largest nearby hospital so that our most ill patients can be referred to the hospital with his input.

Be assured that every project that you help fund reflects our commitment to partnership and sustainability.

The magic of Haiti and the Haitian people—that same magic you feel in the art—persists, speaking to the resilience, power, dignity, and joy that is in every Haitian. And despite the uncertainty, chaos, and violence of this moment, our partners in Haiti are moving courageously and steadfastly forward. They are truly unstoppable.

While we sadly have not been able to go to Haiti since 2019, our work there and here progresses. The life-giving, capacity-building work at our clinic continues. The construction of the first art school in Gros Morne continues. Education programs continue, nourishing the minds and bodies of the people in the community.

The Haitian people's resilience continues to amaze and inspire us. As we like to say, "anything is possible!"



Uncertain Futures, Exciting Possibilities

Reflections from the Alumni Board

It is one feat to develop an organization into an impactful and reputable change-maker—and another to ensure it continues to thrive. For 22 years, the Haiti Project has accomplished both. We have grown and delivered on our mission each and every year. Our increasingly volatile world prompted the Alumnae/i Board to initiate a process to reflect on the organization's direction. We began working more closely with the Executive Board to ensure the longevity of the Project and its impacts.

With the guidance of Sahara Pradhan '15, we designed and facilitated an in-person workshop this spring with the Board to discuss organizational resiliency. We considered how the Haiti Project can continue to fulfill commitments to our partners in Haiti in the context of intersecting shocks and stressors. How might the Haiti Project exist in a future impacted by political instability? Climate shocks? A changing donor landscape? We prompted Board Members to use these uncertainties to imagine multiple potential 'futures' for the Project. With narratives of these 'futures' we will begin to take steps to ensure the Project is ready and able to meet future challenges.

We feel immensely privileged to continue to collaborate with the Haiti Project and leverage skills from our emerging career back to the organization that launched them. It was surreal to stand in front of the Board and facilitate this kind of discussion. This is a testament to the Project's impact on us and countless others—developing and empowering passionate, capable leaders.

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT: PAARUL SINHA, MD

As a college student, it was truly amazing to develop my passion for medicine while interacting with so many doctors who are established in their careers and yet who carve out time to promote health equity and mentor. I became involved with our health initiative and was chosen to support the team on logistics for our annual fundraiser, Art & Soul. I not only worked on the guest lists and the endless "to do" and was so happy to connect the names of our guests by meeting and speaking to them about my experiences at the clinic.

I also remember sitting in a meeting with Dr. David Cho (Medical Advisory Board chair) discussing medications that needed to be stocked at our clinic for a year. This experience was key for me landing a job right out of college as an assistant to a Medical Director of a primary care clinic. Additionally, going to Haiti twice during my college career opened my eyes to the cultural barriers that need to be overcome in global health initiatives, and being able to verbalize this has put me at a huge advantage while applying to medical school and residency.

HAITI IN THE VASSAR CURRICULUM

The Magic of Haitian Kreyol

I have had the privilege of contributing to the VC curriculum as the Haitian Kreyol tutor, sharing the magic of this special language with students who have an interest in Haiti. Some want to learn it because of their involvement with the Vassar Haiti Project, and others because they want to connect with their heritage as Haitian Americans. I grew up in Haiti and Kreyol is my native language.

To truly appreciate a culture, it is not enough to learn the history, taste the food, listen to the music, and appreciate the artistic creation of its people. Learning to speak the language allows you get deep into the heart and soul, that is the magic of the culture.

Kreyol is phonetic and has its unique characteristic. Born as a result of the interaction between slaves originating from diverse African tribes and French owners, it has evolved to become the identity of the first black led republic and the first colony to declare its independence from French control and slavery in 1804. The richness of Kreyol is found in its storytelling and proverbs. Today, Haiti is struggling more than ever before. Yet, as any Haitian would tell you: "Tout otan ou gen tèt, ou ka mete chapo." (Literally, as long as you have a head you can wear a hat. Meaning, "As long as you are alive, you can accomplish anything." That is the Kreyol magic.

The film left a lasting impression on all of us present that evening, sparking conversations and fostering a deeper appreciation for the transformative impact of art in even the most challenging of circumstances. As questions filled the room, an underlying message emerged: "What can we do?" or "What comes next?". SUPPORTING EDUCATION

Breakfast Program



Many children in the NW mountains of Haiti walk hours to get to the school in Chermaitre. Because of limited access to food, this long morning walk takes place on an empty stomach. By the time the children reach school, they are very hungry, making it hard for them to focus on their studies. Julia Humiston's generous funding of VHP's Breakfast Program, as well as our passion and persistence, has made VHP's Breakfast Program become a reality and now a tradition! The children now arrive at school with a fresh plate of breakfast in the morning, hunger pains and anxieties mitigated.

The Breakfast Program serves nearly 250 students, supplementing VHP's existing lunch program. The menu includes bread, bananas, eggs, juice, fruits, and coffee.

Adult Education

With the help of our Haitian partners on the ground, the Adult Education program has provided the men and women of Chermaitre to learn the skills they need to advance personally and academically. Some of the program's offerings include co-op management and leadership in addition to literacy skills such as reading, writing, and math. A recent highlight has been bringing the women's cooperative back together after being disbanded for almost a year. With additional fundraising efforts and initiatives, the Adult Education program will be able to be sustained and continue to enrich Haitian men and women in the village of Chermaitre.



Our next goal will be to disperse small micro-financing loans to the women. This is their ask to us and our next campaign will be assisting them financially with small amounts of money so that they can then use that money to create small businesses. We're looking for a donor who can help us start a program for \$5,000 with a small group of women who will be part of our test pilot program.

In 2012, she invited prominent local physicians to form our Advisory Board, connecting us at the start with its first chair, Danny Z. Aronzon, MD, and also Dan Katz, MD, both of whom guided the functions of the clinic and annual fundraising efforts. Through her vast network, Ms. Belok has been a champion for the Vassar Haiti Project, offering guidance and ideas to enhance the capacity of our work in Haiti.




Dr. Gueslin Joassainvil, former director and physician of the Fiervil clinic, launched its opening in 2014, bringing professional medical standards and promoting healthcare education. During his tenure as director (2014-2022), Dr. Joassainvil would take the bus from Port au Prince to Gonaives, two motorcycles from Gonaives to Fiervil, and cross the river, often by foot, to arrive at the clinic perhaps seven hours later. He considered this sacrifice necessary as he wanted to contribute to the goal of saving lives in the villages that previously lacked healthcare. He is a source of inspiration and motivation for our VHP students who had the opportunity of collaborating with him on the development of the clinic.



Girls' Health

The Vassar Haiti Project's Health Committee has been working on girl's health education ever since VHP students noticed negative views of menstrual health during a trip to Haiti many years ago. Since that time, we have researched pedagogical methods of teaching menstrual and female health and collaborated with alums and physicians from our Medical Advisory Board, both here and in Chermaitre, to find the best ways to educate and empower young women about their bodies.

Two outcomes of these efforts are a brochure and a booklet that present information about menstrual health in a positive and supportive light. We are in the final stages of preparation to send these resources to Chermaitre, where they will become part of the curriculum for a menstrual health class for the girls and young women of the area. This class is the culmination of years of student and community effort and will be the first step towards our goal to address the larger health and social issues that the girls and women of northwestern Haiti face.

Families' Weekend Sale at Vassar

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



NEW PROJECTS THAT NEED YOUR SUPPORT

People often ask, "How can I help?" Our work in Haiti has been ongoing with proven results for over 21 years as you can see from all the articles in this report. We assess the needs of the villages and work closely with our partners to determine "What's next".

Here are some programs that you can help support:

Adult Education: Annual Goal: \$7,000

Women and men of the village are excited to learn the basics of reading and mathematics. Continuing this program will help to create a more educated population. Recent graduates have been able to take out loans using their new skills.

Chick Program: Annual Goal: \$5,000

We are offering each child in our primary school a single chick that can be taken home and nurtured. When the chick matures, their laid eggs can be used as a form of nutrition for not only the families in Chermaitre but each child will be able to bring in eggs to help supplement the breakfast program.

Primary School Lunch Program: Annual Goal: \$10,000

This was our very first funding program, and it remains essential to this day. As was true then and still is today, rural mountain families often will not send their children to school unless they will receive food.

Reforestation Program: Annual Goal: \$10,000

It is essential that we continue planting trees in the area, which helps to minimize soil erosion and also to enhance community food security. 40,000 trees have been planted to date.

Women's Program - Microfinancing: Start-up Goal: \$10,000

The women are very excited to start little businesses to help supplement their income by selling food and other necessities.
